This Agreement is made in pursuant to section 45 of the National Forestry and tree planting Act, 2001.

## COLLABORATIVE FOREST MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT

### 2.0 DESCRIPTION OF THE PARTIES INVOLVED

(i) National Forestry Authority, P.O. Box 2000 Kampala UGANDA,

National Forestry Authority (NFA) has Responsible body mandated to administer, manage Central Forest Reserve in Uganda for a community benefit, including social and economic development purposes. Uganda.

(ii) MAR-YEN COLLABORATIVE FOREST MANAGEMENT GROUP (MCFMG), COMBINED AKA

### PART OF AGORO-AGU CENTRAL FOREST RESERVE

Comprises of a total of 387 with 288 males and 174 females covering 300 households drawn from six (6) parishes, namely; Paka, Paken, Kajjansi, Agoro, Agu and Nyamanya.

### 3.0 THE FOREST

### NATIONAL FORESTRY AUTHORITY (NFA)

This agreement is for collaborative management of Agoro-Agu Central Forest Reserve situated in Lamwo district, Lamwo County, Uganda. Comprising, surrounded by thirty nine local councils (LCs) that are, Owinyi locality A, Owinyi locality B, Kiteke, Ologi locality, Pitter, Lobule A, Lokole B, Lalelele, Okello, Louwaka A, Lemwaka B, Lape, Lape, Lape-agira, Yewya ex. Mombi, Gati, Mombi West, Obong, Panyihuk, Polong A, Polong B, Laph, Lape, Bafinyi A, dower, okello, Agoro village A, Agoro Odoki A, L, Janengi, Iruwu, Igolam A, Dalem B, B, B, B, Igolam, Balonyi A, Kwen, North, Kwen South, Pase, Yenyo East and West.

### MAR-YEN CFM GROUP

### (MCFMG)

It is agreed that the MCFMG shall collaborate, manage the forest reserve with the National Forest Authority under the following objectives:

#### 4.1 Shared Vision

A regular and governed Agoro-Agu Central Forest Reserve for improved livelihoods of the community by 2040.

#### 4.2 Objectives

1. To restore and conserve the degraded area in Agoro-Agu Central Forest Reserve
2. To promote the alternative ways of livelihood in the community

## **1.0 PREAMBLE**

This Agreement is made in pursuant to section 15 of the National Forestry and Tree planting Act, 2003 between the **National Forestry Authority (NFA) and Mar-Yen collaborative forest management group (MCFMG)** this 29<sup>th</sup>-day of August 2017

## **2.0 DESCRIPTION OF THE PARTIES INVOLVED**

i) National Forestry Authority, P.O. Box 70863 Kampala UGANDA;

National Forestry Authority (NFA) is a Responsible Body mandated to sustainably manage Central Forest Reserves in Uganda for a **sufficiently forested, ecologically stable, and economically prosperous Uganda.**

ii) MAR-YEN COLLOBORATIVE FOREST MANAGEMENT GROUP (MCFMG), C/O P.O BOX 1, AGORO SUB COUNTY, LAMWO DISTRICT, is interested forest user group, secondary level CBO. It comprises of a total of 462 with 288 males and 174 females covering 340 households drawn from six (6) parishes, namely: - Potika, Pawach, Lopulingi, Dibo-lyec, Rudi and Ngacino

## **3.0 THE FOREST**

This agreement is for collaborative management of part of Agoro- Agu Central Forest Reserve situated in Lamwo district, Lamwo County, Agoro Sub County, surrounded by thirty nine local councils( 37), that is:- Cwinyi moribe A, Cwinyi Moribe B, Simba, Cing Ionyo, Pitber, Lobule A, Lobule B, Labedo- ociti, Lomwaka A, Lomwaka B, Larac- odong, Loyo-ayela, Yweyo pe, Moroto East, Moroto West, Oboko, Peny-buk, Polongo A, Polong B, Logu, Logede, Pakinyi A, Aweno- olwi, Agula odiciri A, Agula- Odiciri B, Lamogi, Irumo, Goloro A, Goloro B, Ber Jabo, Irumo, Pakinyi B, Kwera North, Kwera South, Pateke, Ywaya East and West.

## **4.0 OBJECTIVES**

It is agreed that the MCFMG shall collaboratively manage the forest reserve with the National Forest Authority under the following objectives.

### **4.1 Shared Vision**

A restored and conserved Agoro- Agu Central Forest Reserve for improved livelihoods of the community by 2040.

### **4.2 Objectives**

1. To restore and conserve the degraded areas in Agoro- Agu Central Forest Reserve
2. To promote the alternative ways of livelihood for the community

3. To strengthen the management capacity of Mar-Yen CBO
4. To promote Eco-tourism in Agoro- Agu Central Forest Reserve and the forest adjacent communities.

## **5.0 ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PARTIES**

### **5.1 Roles of Mar-Yen Collaborative Forest Management group**

- a) The community undertakes to adhere to prescriptions of the collaborative forest management plan in implementing the various activities laid out herein.
- b) The following shall be roles of Mar-Yen collaborative management group in Agoro- Agu Central Forest Reserve.
  - i) Jointly patrol the forest against all forms of illegal activities.
  - ii) Create awareness and promote environmental conservation.
  - iii) Manage funds generated from CFM activities.
  - iv) Mobilise the community for forest management activities.
  - v) Formulate penalties for offenders of CFM plan.
  - vi) Resolve conflicts related to management of the forest.
  - vii) Participate in apprehending culprits.
  - viii) Conduct meetings.
  - ix) Network with other development partners and lobby for funds.
  - x) Prepare progress reports on CFM implementation.

### **5.2 Roles / Responsibilities of National Forestry Authority (NFA)**

The following shall be the roles of National Forestry Authority.

- i) Jointly monitor the implementation of CFM plan with Mar-Yen CFM group
- ii) Manage Agoro-Agu CFR.
- iii) Collect revenue from commercial resource use if any.
- iv) Support where possible the implementation of projects such as bee keeping, Tree planting, Fruit growing, fish farming, ecotourism establishment.
- v) Supervise resource extraction.
- vi) Provide technical advice and guidance for the implementation of activities within the management plan.
- vii) Issue a tree planting licence to Mar-Yen CFM group as a community based organisation.

- viii) Issue licenses and permits for resource use in accordance with the National Forestry and Tree Planting Act 2003, and any other relevant regulations and guidelines.
- ix) Jointly patrol and protect the forest with Mar-Yen CFM group.
- x) Mobilize and sensitize the community on general conservation issues.
- xi) Link the community to other development partners.
- xii) Keep records for resource use.

### **5.3 Roles / Responsibilities of Local Government**

- i) Help in resolving conflicts
- ii) Give moral and financial support to Mar-Yen CFM group in implementation of CFM plan.
- iii) Help in monitoring implementation of activities.
- iv) Apprehend offenders.
- v) Good publicity
- vi) Collect market dues and forest dues.

## **6.0 RIGHTS AND BENEFITS**

### **6.1 Benefits of Mar-Yen CFM group**

- i) Income from forestry related activities.
- ii) Improved relations with NFA staff.
- iii) Legally recognised access to forest resources for livelihoods.
- iv) Employment opportunities.
- v) Fame and recognition.

### **6.2 Benefits of National Forestry Authority**

- i) Better managed and conserved forest.
- ii) Revenue from licensed activities.
- iii) Improved relations with the local community.
- iv) Good publicity

### **6.3 Benefits of Local Government**

- i) Peaceful community and organised community
- ii) Improved relationships with NFA.
- iii) Good publicity

**Note:** For the entire duration of this agreement, the community shall be entitled to the rights and benefits set out in this agreement and as specified in the collaborative Forest Management Plan. The signing parties may agree to modify benefits from time to time during the process of reviewing the Collaborative Forest Management Plan after which they can be adopted.

NFA and other stakeholders are also entitled to benefits portrayed in the Collaborative Forest Management plan attached.

## **7.0 DURATION OF THE AGREEMENT**

Subject to the National Forestry and Tree Planting Act 2003 and the CFM regulations the contents of this agreement will remain applicable for a period of ten (10) years from the date of signing. The agreement shall be reviewed initially after three (3) year and then after every two (2) years if the parties are in compliance with the obligations under the CFM agreement.

## **8.0 REVIEW, REVISION AND RENEWAL**

National Forestry Authority shall notify all parties to be involved in review and revision of the CFM plan initially after three (3) year and then after every two (2) years. However, the day-to-day monitoring based on the plan will be done by the responsible parties.

Upon expiry of the agreement the parties may agree to have it renewed. MCFMG shall apply for renewal 12 months before the expiry of the existing agreement. The same procedure as for the application shall be applied with modifications as the parties may deem necessary.

Mar-Yen CFM Group shall submit to the NFA bi-annual reports of its activities and operations as set in the agreement plus other adhoc reports the NFA may in its supervisory capacity require the Mar-Yen CFM Group to prepare day-to-day monitoring based on the plan will be done by the responsible parties.

## **9.0 BREACHES**

Subject to the National Forestry and Tree Planting Act, 2003, the Forestry Policy 2001, CFM guidelines 2003, the Forest Management Plan for Agoro-Agu Management Plan Area and any other relevant regulations and guidelines, breaches of this agreement shall be dealt with as follows:

- All breaches perpetrated by an individual or individuals who are not members of MCFMG to which the said forest has been attributed, shall be dealt with in accordance with the National Forestry and Tree Planting Act, 2003 and any other relevant regulations.
- In cases where MCFMG as a whole colludes in breach of this agreement, the National Forestry and Tree Planting Act, 2003 and any other relevant regulations and guidelines, such breach shall lead to annulment of this agreement. This will be communicated in writing by the National Forestry Authority.

## 10.0 MECHANISM FOR DISPUTE RESOLUTION

- a) Any dispute arising between the parties in relation to the interpretation, application and implementation of this agreement shall be settled amicably by the parties within Ten (10) days of its occurrence.
- b) In the event that the parties fail to settle the dispute in the manner envisaged in clause 10 (a) herein, the matter shall be referred to mediation by a single mediator.
- c) A mediator shall be a person who is knowledgeable in the subject of the dispute, impartial and must be mutually agreed upon by both parties.
- d) If the dispute remains unresolved after sixty (60) days of commencement of the mediation sessions, the parties shall then refer the matter to court.

## 11.0 TERMINATION OF THE AGREEMENT

- a) Either party may terminate this agreement by giving a written notification within 90 days with reasons of its intention to terminate to the other party which may within 30 days of receipt thereof request that the matter be reconsidered.
- b) Reconsideration of an intention to terminate this agreement shall be done by the intending party and the response communicated in writing to the other party within forty five (45) days of receipt of the request.
- c) If the intending party resolves that it no longer intends to terminate this agreement, the agreement shall be deemed to continue as though the notice in 11 (a) had never been issued.
- d) If no request for reconsideration is made by the recipient party, this agreement shall be deemed to have been terminated upon expiry of the ninety (90) days' notice.

## 12.0 SIGNATORIES

The contracting parties solemnly declare that they are aware of the prescriptions of Collaborative Forest Management plan terms and content of this agreement and accept without reservation all the provisions.

This agreement shall take effect from the date of signature and shall last for its duration unless annulled in accordance with the Forestry regulations.







## 1.0 INTRODUCTION

### 1.1 Background to the management plan

The increasing population of the local people adjacent to Agoro-Agu Central Forest Reserve has resulted into high dependency levels on the forest resources and clearing of forest land for agricultural purposes. This has led to the over-exploitation over time in addition to interference of the forest.

## COLLABORATIVE FOREST MANAGEMENT PLAN

Collaborative Forest Management is a mutually agreed arrangement between the forest adjacent communities and the responsible body on the responsibilities. Right and interests in a forest reserve is therefore important for a group of individuals and forest management that can support the livelihoods of the people.

-**CFM Areas:** are tranches of integrated forest adjacent communities through a shared agreement with a responsible body concerning access and management of forest resources in a given CFR. This collaboration means more than just A. a sustainable ownership by the community, but it is a way of ensuring them to be preparing for the resources from which they benefit. This provides opportunities for the communities to participate in forest resource management.

Agoro-Agu CFR, which covers a total area of 26,300ha, was gazetted in the year 1917 under Statutory Instrument No. 1998 and No. 63 of 1968. The Forest is protected in trust for the people as stipulated in article 827(3) of the constitution of the Republic of Uganda. 1995. Management and control of Agoro-Agu CFR is vested in National Forestry Authority in accordance with section 34(1)(d) of the National Forestry and Tree Planting Act, 2003.

## **1.0 INTRODUCTION**

### **1.1 Background to the management plan**

The increasing population of the local people adjacent to Agoro- Agu Central Forest Reserve has resulted into high dependency levels on the forest resources and clearing of forest land for agricultural purposes. This has reduced the forest vegetation cover in addition to interference of the forest reserve boundaries.

Collaborative Forest Management, a mutually agreed arrangement between the forest adjacent communities and the responsible body on Roles/Responsibilities, Rights and Returns in a forest reserve is therefore important for a conserved and improved forest management that can support the livelihoods of the people.

CFM focuses on improving the livelihoods of interested forest adjacent communities through a shared agreement with a responsible body concerning access and management of forest resources in a given CFR. This collaboration does not mean that NFA surrenders ownership to the community, but it is a way of encouraging them to be responsible for the resources from which they benefit. This provides opportunity for the communities to participate in forest resources management.

## **1.2 Physical Geography**

### **1.2.1 Location**

Agoro-Agu Central Forest Reserve is located in Sub-county of Agoro, Lamwo County, Lamwo District. It is surrounded by several local councils that include; Cwinyi moribe A, Cwinyi Moribe B, Simba, Cing lonyo, Pitber, Lobule A, Lobule B, Labedo- ociti, Lomwaka A, Lomwaka B, Larac- odong, Loyo-ayela, Yweyo pe, Moroto East, Moroto West, Oboko, Peny-buk, Polongo A, Polong B, Logu, Logede, Pakinyi A, Aweno- olwi, Agula odiciri A, Agula- Odiciri B, Lamogi, Irumo, Goloro A, Goloro B, Ber lobo, Irumo, Pakinyi B, Kwera North, Kwera South, Pateke, Ywaya East and West.

### **1.2.2 CFM Area**

This area is located in part of Agoro-Agu CFR, Lamwo District, Lamwo County, Agoro Sub county and covers the Parishes of:- Potika, Pawach, Lopulingi, Dibo-lyec, Rudi and Ngacino.

### **1.2.3 Area, Demarcation, Gazetttement, Legal status and Ownership**

Agoro- Agu CFR which covers a total area of 26,508ha, was gazetted in the year 1937 under Statutory Instruments 1998 and No.63 of 1968. The forest is protected in trust for the people as stipulated in article 237(2) of the constitution of the Republic of Uganda, 1995. Management and control of Agoro- Agu CFR is vested in National Forestry Authority in accordance with section 54(1) (a) of the National Forestry and Tree Planting Act, 2003.

### **1.2.4 Topography and Geology**

Agoro- Agu Central Forest Reserve is situated on the undulating ground with occasional rock out crops. It has massive forming escarpments at isolated points. It's a mountainous -- hilly reserve dissected by streams and river valleys.

The geological formations are gneiss and granite of the basement complex, with granite bare rock over much of its area rounded by weathering, covered by shallow soils except at the foot of escarpments and in the valleys. Gray brown sands overlying red clay or brown sandy loam to brown sandy soils and brown characterized the area.

#### **1.2.5 Vegetation and Forest Condition**

Agoro-Agu CFR is mainly a woodland and montane type with dry combretum savannah, forest savannah and dry montane forest. The forest has bamboo dominant moist thicket and savannah woodlands and grasslands.

The forest is generally good on the hills and lowland. There are basically no swampy areas and most water sources are seasonal except for river Aringa which is permanent.

#### **1.2.6 Biodiversity Value**

Agoro -Agu CFR has a high biodiversity value though it's partly degraded by agricultural encroachers. The forest is part of the network for critical biodiversity sites in Uganda and supports 7 species of unique trees and shrubs according to the Forest Nature Conservation Master Plan. It is also ranked 19<sup>th</sup> in overall importance out of the 65 forests investigated for biodiversity. The forest generally serves the important functions of protecting biodiversity, water catchments, riverbanks and stabilizing the steep slopes.

## **2.0 THE NEGOTIATED PLAN OF ACTION**

#### **2.1.1 The shared Vision**

A restored and conserved Agoro- Agu Central Forest Reserve for improved livelihoods of the community by 2040.

- i) To restore and conserve the degraded areas of Agoro – Agu CFR.
- ii) To promote alternative ways of livelihood for the community adjacent to Agoro- Agu CFR.
- iii) To strengthen the management capacity of Mar-Yen CBO
- iv) To promote Ecotourism in Agoro- Agu CFR and Mar-Yen community.

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### 3.6 Duration of the plan

This management plan is for a period of ten years (10) from 2017 to 2027. Scheduled reviews will be under taken initially after 3 years and then after every 2 years. MCFMG shall make one (1) annual work plan and reviews shall be under taken if results from the monitoring programme indicate that it is necessary.

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#### **4.7 TIMBER**

Agoro-Agu CFR is classified as a critical site for biodiversity conservation. This forest is a water catchment to some seasonal swamps and river Aringa as the permanent water body. Because of its ecological functions, it's not recommended for timber harvesting both domestic and for commercial purposes.

#### **4.8 ACCESS TO MEDINAL HERBS**

The community has free access to herbs for domestic use. Commercial extraction of resources shall be done with permit or license as issued by NFA. Collecting without permission or a license is prohibited and the culprit may be fined as per the law and the resource taken from him. The user group of herbs/medicines is encouraged to domesticate herbs.

#### **4.9 OTHER RESOURCES (FOREST FOODS, FIBRES AND CRAFT MATERIALS)**

These resources are extracted for domestic use/ livelihoods purposes. The harvesting levels of fibres are during the dry season or when the need arises. It's generally agreed that, the community shall continue to access these resources as it has been.

However, NFA and the CFM executive committee shall continue monitoring the extraction levels and thereby set bi-laws in case the levels increase in the near future. This shall be done during the periodic review of the plan.

### **5.0 ALTERNATIVES**

#### **5.0.1 FRUIT GROWING**

This is an alternative for promoting/improving livelihoods. The user group of Agoro-Agu forest will be mobilised and trained on improved fruit trees species. Fruit trees shall be planted on Local community private land. Improved fruits species like oranges, Mangoes, avocados, Passion fruit and Jack fruit among others shall be planted. The CFM group members with guidance from NFA and other stakeholders like Local Government through CDO's office, OWC, IUCN, AIVI, and EA will do the following:

- Prepare project proposal for fruit growing.
- Identify interested individuals members.
- Seek support from other stakeholders inform of capacity building and funds for buying the fruit trees.
- Buy and plant seedlings of improved fruits species.
- Maintain the planted fruit trees.
- Harvest and take some fruits for house hold use and sale.
- Market the products.
- Discuss the benefit sharing procedure of the project.

#### **5.0.2 FISH FARMING**

Fish farming shall be practised as another alternative income generating activity. This shall be done by Mar-Yen CFM group member of Agoro-Agu CFR. Members will be mobilised and trained as the need arises. It is generally agreed that this activity shall be done either in Agoro-Agu forest in case the streams for fish pond establishment are available or on private land. The CFM group members with guidance from NFA and other stakeholders like Local Government through the CDO's office, OWC, IUCN, AIVI, and EA will do the following:

- Prepare project proposal for fish farming.
- Identify interested individuals members.
- Seek support from other stakeholders inform of capacity building and funds for necessary equipment.
- Train people in fish farming.
- Identify the best sites for fish farming with the assistance of fisheries department.
- Harvest and sale fish.

- Dig the fish ponds.
- Maintain the ponds.
- Market the products.
- Discuss use/sharing of benefits from the project
- Set by-laws / regulations.

## **6.0 THER MANAGEMENT ASPECTS**

### **6.0.1 FIRE MANAGEMENT**

Agoro- Agu CFR is usually affected by fires. These fires are in some cases intended (caused by hunters and agricultural encroachers) and sometimes they are actually wild fires.

Interventions

- Establishment of fire lines before the fire season( especially around the tree planted area by the CFM group)
- Controlled and early burning around the forest.
- Sensitization of the forest adjacent community.
- Formulation of by-laws.
- Coordination with partners like Lutheran World Federation (LWF) which is conducting research on fires in the region.

**Note:** LWF shall communicate to the NFA its finding and can be adopted in the plan where applicable.

### **6.0.2 MANAGEMENT ROAD**

Agoro –Agu CFR has a forest management road which goes through the forest from the boundary to the enclave, a stretch of 13km.

The forest road is in a very bad condition and urgently needs to be maintained. The poor state of the road is affecting forest management and the tourism activities that should have taken place in the forest and the adjacent community.

NFA and Lamwo District Local government need to repair this management road.

### **6.0.3 RESEARCH**

Makerere University is currently conducting research on propagation/ conservation of endangered cycad species. However, Cycad is not on the IUCN list of endangered species. The recommendations shall be communicated to the relevant partners and stakeholders.

Research shall be conducted in this forest on permit from NFA.

### **6.0.4 HUNTING**

Hunting is not allowed as it's against the Uganda Wildlife Act.

However, a casual spot hunting license can be issued to interest individuals through the Uganda Wildlife Authority (UWA) in collaboration with the Sub County leaders and NFA.


